Course prerequisites

This class is open for master students of the University of St.Gallen.

Course content

The Workshop & Lecture Series on the Law & Economics of Innovation is a joint project of the ETH Zurich, the University of St.Gallen and the University of Zurich. Some of the most renowned law and innovation scholars will give lectures on different topics in law and innovation. The seminar takes place at the University of Zurich and the ETH Zurich. Participants discuss current law and innovation issues with guest scholars from Europe and the U.S. in class and will write two comments on the papers presented by the lecturers.

Term papers

- Term papers must be written without anyone else's help and in accordance with the known quotation standards, and they must contain a declaration of authorship.
- The documentation of sources (quotations, bibliography) has to be done throughout and consistently in accordance with the APA or MLA standards. The indications of the sources of information taken over verbatim or in paraphrase (quotations) must be integrated into the text in accordance with the precepts of the applicable quotation standard, while informative and bibliographical notes must be added as footnotes (recommendations and standards can be found, for example, in METZGER, C. (2017), *Lern- und Arbeitsstrategien* (12th ed., Cornelsen Schweiz).
- For any work written at the HSG, the indication of the page numbers both according to the MLA and the APA standard is never optional.
- Where there are no page numbers in sources, precise references must be provided in a different way: titles of chapters or sections, section numbers, acts, scenes, verses, etc.
- For papers in law, the legal standard is recommended (by way of example, cf. FORSTMOSER, P., OGOREK R. et SCHINDLER B. (2018, *Juristisches Arbeiten: Eine Anleitung für Studierende* (6. Auflage), Zürich: Schulthess, or the recommendations of the Law School).

Examination content

Two comments have to be written on two different papers (from two different guests; double-spaced, about 2500 words each, including footnotes).

Comments can relate to one of the background papers posted for a lecture or to a paper to be discussed during a workshop. The idea is not to summarize the paper, but to either comment on one of the issues or, to the extent it is a working paper, provide constructive critique about points that deserve further analysis. Comments will not be discussed as such during the lectures or workshops. But you should participate in the discussion (e.g. by asking a question) during the session for which the discussed paper is posted. Active participation in the other workshops is greatly encouraged.
