Learning objectives

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to

- Describe the political framework of the EU and Switzerland and its impact on the management of private firms in Europe
- Explain the concept of asset allocation & investment styles
- Critically analyse risk and return
- Explain the entrepreneurship process
- Assess entrepreneurial opportunities using a structured approach
- Outline the principles for competitive products and services
- Determine the attributes of service excellence

Course content

The Management in Europe (MiE) programme provides an insight into the Swiss and broader European business system. MiE will also serve as a forum for cultural exchange between Singaporean and Swiss students. Additionally, participants will experience the cultural diversity of Switzerland. Classroom learning will be supplemented with compulsory company visits and cultural activities relating to the topics taught in class. An excursion to Geneva and Lausanne, comprising of company visits and international organizations (World Trade Organization and United Nations) will take place half-way through the programme.

This integrated combination of learning is ideally suited for 3rd year bachelor students. The course is organised primarily for 30 students from Singapore Management University (SMU). MiE is also open for exchange students from other Universities and for regular students from the University of St. Gallen.

The total learning portfolio amounts to 72 hours of classes, plus excursions, self-study, the writing of a logbook and the written exam. This course is awarded with 8 ECTS.

Course structure

MiE is a block course run on an intensive mode over a period of one month.

The programme comprises two modules, with two sub-topics each:



Module 1: Services and Banking

Topic 1: Entrepreneurial Service Management, Prof. Dr. Jörg-Michael Gasda (18 hours of class)

Topic 2: Banking and Finance, Dr. Arik Röschke (18 hours of class)

Module 2: Doing Business in Europe

Topic 3: Framework Conditions for Doing Business in Switzerland and the EU, Dr. Stefan Legge (18 hours of class)

Topic 4: Entrepreneurship, Prof. Dr. Thierry Volery (18 hours of class)

Term papers

- Term papers must be written without anyone else's help and in accordance with the known quotation standards, and they must contain a declaration of authorship.
- The documentation of sources (quotations, bibliography) has to be done throughout and consistently in accordance with the APA or MLA standards. The indications of the sources of information taken over verbatim or in paraphrase (quotations) must be integrated into the text in accordance with the precepts of the applicable quotation standard, while informative and bibliographical notes must be added as footnotes (recommendations and standards can be found, for example, in METZGER, C. (2017), Lern- und Arbeitsstrategien (12th ed., Cornelsen Schweiz).
- For any work written at the HSG, the indication of the page numbers both according to the MLA and the APA standard is never optional.
- Where there are no page numbers in sources, precise references must be provided in a different way: titles of chapters or sections, section numbers, acts, scenes, verses, etc.
- For papers in law, the legal standard is recommended (by way of example, cf. FORSTMOSER, P., OGOREK R. et SCHINDLER B. (2018, Juristisches Arbeiten: Eine Anleitung für Studierende (6. Auflage), Zürich: Schulthess, or the recommendations of the Law School).
