Course information

Course prerequisites

Students should have a basic understanding of the major theories of international relations. Students who have never taken an introductory course should consult one of the introductory text books to the field in advance of the semester.

Learning objectives

Students will develop a basic understanding of fundamental tools of statecraft. They will be familiar with the logic informing theoretical analyses of strategies available to states for pursuing their interests in an anarchic international system and develop the ability to: 1) critically evaluate efforts to employ these strategies in real-world situations through the analysis of case studies; and 2) present their critiques with suggestions for improved foreign policy .

Course content

This course is devoted to the study of statecraft. The goal is to:

- 1. familiarize students with the academic literature devoted to the analysis of recurring foreign policy problems and the range of strategies available for managing them;
- 2. allow students to evaluate the utility of these general strategies through detailed analysis of individual cases.

Through the integration of theory and foreign policy practice students will gain insights into the trade-offs - both in terms of interests and values - demanded by the anarchic nature of international politics.

Additional course information

Ideally, this seminar will be conducted in person on campus. In the event that the ongoing pandemic requires on-line instruction, we will move to Zoom or MSTeams. Discussions of the readings will take place online with the sessions available online for a maximum of 30 days for students who cannot attend the virtual session because of illness (documented by a doctor's note). In the event of on-line instruction, group presentations can take place either live or via voice-over-powerpoint presentations that will be made available in advance of the session. If groups choose the voic-over-powerpoint option, participants will have had an opportunity to view the presentation after which we will convene as a group in Zoom or MSTeams for discussion.

In the event that on-line instruction continues through the end of the semester, the final exam will take the form of an essay students can write at home, with questions being distributed on the last day of class and answers due the following Monday.

Examination content
