#### Course information

##### Course prerequisites

Enrollment in a course is binding: students have to attend the course and take the exam. The grade will be shown on the scorecard.

##### Learning objectives

- Students learn to write academic papers for conference or journal submissions
- Students learn to discuss and evaluate the academic writing of their peers

##### Course content

Publication of research is one of the most important criteria according to which academics are evaluated. Increasingly articles/papers are becoming the most important form of publication in the social sciences. The goal of the course is to train students to write a paper. Each participant will work on a paper (usually from the topic of her/his dissertation). Each step in the production of the paper is discussed in class, i.e. we read and comment on each others' work in progress. Ultimately each participant should produce a paper that could be submitted either for a conference or to an academic journal. The basic idea behind the course is that we can learn from one another. As each participant will benefit from learning about how others construct their paper, draft their abstract, find "catchy" titles, write their introduction, etc., the success of the seminar strongly depends on the willingness of participants to engage with others' work and to accept critiques and suggestions from peers in the group.

##### Course structure and indications of the learning and teaching design

The course is organized in six sessions (with the last session taking place after the regular teaching period to allow participants to finalize their papers):

Session 1: Introduction to course, best practices, titles and abstracts

Session 2: Discussion of introductory section

Session 3: Discussion of state of the art / literature review sections (or other part, depending on specific paper)

Session 4: Discussion of theory and method sections (or other part, depending on specific paper)

Session 5: Discussion of empirical section (or other part, depending on specific paper)

Session 6: Discussion of concluding sections



If individual papers deviate from the structure sketched above, do not worry, we'll find a way to deal with this.

Participation rule: you may miss one session but not more.

## Course literature

For all sessions, participants are expected to read the sections written by the other course participants.

Term papers

Written work must be written without outside help according to the known citation standards, and a declaration of authorship must be attached, which is available as a template on the StudentWeb.

Documentation (quotations, bibliography, etc.) must be carried out universally and consistently according to the requirements of the chosen/specified citation standard such as e.g. APA or MLA.

The legal standard is recommended for legal work (cf. by way of example: FORSTMOSER, P., OGOREK R., SCHINDLER B., Juristisches Arbeiten: Eine Anleitung für Studierende (the latest edition in each case), or according to the recommendations of the Law School).

The reference sources of information (paraphrases, quotations, etc.) that has been taken over literally or in the sense of the original text must be integrated into the text in accordance with the requirements of the citation standard used. Informative and bibliographical notes must be included as footnotes (recommendations and standards e.g. in METZGER, C., Lern- und Arbeitsstrategien (latest edition)).

For all written work at the University of St.Gallen, the indication of page numbers is mandatory, regardless of the standard chosen. Where page numbers are missing in sources, the precise designation must be made differently: chapter or section title, section number, article, etc.
