Course information

Course prerequisites

This course aims at MEcon and MiQE/F students. A solid background in micro, macro, and econometrics is required.

Learning objectives

In this course, students learn how to

- 1. organize themselves into effective project teams,
- 2. apply economic analysis to real-world problems,
- 3. produce a concise project report about their work, and
- 4. present their results in a plenary session.

Course content

Students in economics master programs acquire powerful analytical skills, but often miss the opportunity to apply economic analysis to interesting real-world problems. This course offers students in our MEcon and MiQE/F programs the opportunity to gain first-hand experience in applying (both theoretical and empirical) economic analysis to challenging real-world projects, which are proposed by members of the HSG Alumni Economists Club. Students work in groups on one of six real-world projects and are supervised by a faculty member and the HSG Alumna/Alumnus who proposed the project.

Course structure and indications of the learning and teaching design

The course consists of three parts:

- 1. Kickoff meeting at the beginning of the semester
- 2. Groups (ideally composed of 3-4 students) working on their projects under the guidance of the supervision teams
- 3. Presentations of the projects held during the plenary session at the end of the semester

We will have a kickoff meeting at the beginning of the semester and a plenary session at the end of the semester. In the kickoff meeting, the various projects and supervisor teams will be presented. Thereafter, the students will decide which project to take on. Most of the work will be done by the respective project groups, under the guidance of the supervision teams. Towards the end of the semester, each group submits a project report and makes a presentation in the plenary session.

Course literature

There is no mandatory reading for this class. Students work "free style" on their projects, using any literature and materials that they find helpful.

Additional course information

At present both the kick-off meeting as well as the plenary session - including the group presentations - are planned to take place on campus.

Written work must be written without outside help according to the known citation standards, and a declaration of authorship must be attached, which is available as a template on the StudentWeb.

Documentation (quotations, bibliography, etc.) must be carried out universally and consistently according to the requirements of the chosen/specified citation standard such as e.g. APA or MLA.

The legal standard is recommended for legal work (cf. by way of example: FORSTMOSER, P., OGOREK R., SCHINDLER B., Juristisches Arbeiten: Eine Anleitung für Studierende (the latest edition in each case), or according to the recommendations of the Law School).

The reference sources of information (paraphrases, quotations, etc.) that has been taken over literally or in the sense of the original text must be integrated into the text in accordance with the requirements of the citation standard used. Informative and bibliographical notes must be included as footnotes (recommendations and standards e.g. in METZGER, C., Lern- und Arbeitsstrategien (latest edition)).

For all written work at the University of St.Gallen, the indication of page numbers is mandatory, regardless of the standard chosen. Where page numbers are missing in sources, the precise designation must be made differently: chapter or section title, section number, article, etc.

Students are expected to work in groups on one of the six real-world projects proposed by the supervior teams consisting of one HSG faculty member and one HSG Alumna/Alumnus. The project report accounts for 70% of the grade. In addition, students are expected to present their results during the plenary session. The presentation accounts for the remaining 30% of the final grade.
