Learning objectives

- Students have the ability to deal integratively with complex social issues.
- Students are able to explain that statements that emerge from a discipline-based analysis of societal issues (for example, business, economics, law, contextual studies) are not absolute.
- Students recognize interdependencies in approaches to solutions and develop the ability to balance them against each
 other: thus, students do not confuse part and whole.
- Students know about the basic rationalities of the basic subjects business administration, economics, law and contextual studies and their limitations.
- Students thus recognize the contribution each discipline can make on its own and together in solving social problems.
- Students recognize that every social challenge must first be grasped and understood in its essential dimensions before a solution can be worked out.
- Students are able to use tools that can be used to create an integrated overall picture of a problem.

Course content

The "Integrative Project" course enables students to deal with complex social issues in an integrative way. During the course, students learn that statements that result from a discipline-based analysis of social problems (e.g. from the perspectives of economics, law, business administration and contextual studies) are not to be taken as absolutes. Rather, these discipline-based



solutions complement one another. Students recognize interdependencies among problem-solving approaches and develop the ability to weigh them. As a result, they distinguish between part and whole.

Students are aware of the fundamental logics of the basic subjects, economics, law and business administration. They thus recognize what each discipline, seen individually and in conjunction with each other, can contribute to solving social problems. That means they recognize that every social challenge has to be appreciated and understood in its essential dimensions before a solution can be developed.

Against the background of this integrative understanding, students learn about tools that can produce an integrated overall picture of a problem. They learn about these insights through lectures and apply them in group work.

Course structure and indications of the learning and teaching design

An overview of the structure of the course "Integrative Project" is available on StudyNet.

The lectures will be held physically. Lecture 1 will be offered separately for the respective language tracks. The plenary discussion (lecture 2) and the guest lecture (lecture 3) will take place once (across language tracks), with an additional livestream provided via Zoom to address the lack of available seats in the lecture hall.

Please also regularly check the lecture directory (courses.unisg.ch) for the exact dates and rooms of the exercises.

As stipulated in the Assessment Year curriculum, the examination to be passed in the context of the "Integrative Project" course consists of written and oral group work. These examination parts to be taken by fixed groups (so-called examination teams ("Stammteams")) are graded separately, and the two grades are computed into an overall grade.
