Course information

Course prerequisites

None. Knowledge in intermediate macroeconomics, intermediate microeconomics, and basic econometrics/statistics is helpful, but not necessary, as the course is largely self-contained.

Learning objectives

To get a sense for why incomes and living conditions differ across countries, and why some less developed countries grow relatively fast while others stagnate. To understand the empirical evidence on long-run causes of comparative development, the main development theories, and the key concepts relating economic development to: population growth, education, health, agricultural transformation, and urbanization. To learn to apply this knowledge to address development policy questions in a competent manner (and maybe to get some inspiration for your Bachelor thesis).

Course content

Development economics aims at understanding why incomes and living conditions differ across countries, why some less developed countries grow relatively fast while others stagnate, and what can be done to improve living conditions in less developed countries. The first part of the course consists of lectures on the long-run causes of comparative development and the main development theories. The second part discusses key concepts relating economic development to: population growth, education, health, agricultural transformation, and urbanization.

Course structure

The course consists of 6 lectures, 2x2 policy discussion sessions (ungraded), and 2 examination papers. The lectures are conducted via the online platform Zoom. The policy discussion sessions take place on campus, but the class is split into two (based on surnames). The examination papers can be written at home during class hours.

For any work written at the HSG, the indication of the page numbers is mandatory independent of the chosen citation standard. Where there are no page numbers in sources, precise references must be provided in a different way: titles of chapters or sections, section numbers, acts, scenes, verses, etc.
