Learning objectives

The course provides a brief yet rigorous introduction to microeconomics. It consists of two parts, individual decision making and strategic interaction. The course presents the main concepts and illustrates their applications to financial economics.

Module 2. Decision making under uncertainty Choice under uncertainty, risk and stochastic dominance

Module 3. Decision making over time Intertemporal choice

Module 4. Game theory 1. Basic elements of noncooperative games, simultaneous move games

Module 5. Game theory 2. Dynamic games

Module 6. Asymmetric information 1. Principal-agent problem, adverse selection and moral hazard

Module 7. Asymmetric information 2. Competition in contracts, limited commitment, incomplete contracts

Module 8. Market structure. Competitive markets, market power

The course contains 8 modules, two modules per week during weeks 3-6 of Autumn term. Each model is a 3*90 Minutes lecture. The class includes in-depth discussion of the main concepts, problem solving and financial economics application discussions.
