# Course prerequisites

#### Learning objectives

After successfully completing this course, students will be able to identify the key component of leadership relevant to the life and career of a professional. Thanks to the tools and exercises deployed in the course, students will be able to

- Identify evidence of authentic leadership in others.
- Adopt a critical approach to leadership in a professional environment or organization.
- Adopt a followership style that is aligned with their own leadership traits
- Identify their own core set of values and their relationship with real decisions and dilemmas they may confront in their professional future.
- Handle and analyze moral dilemmas within the context of their lives as professionals

### Course content

It is often said that leadership cannot be taught. Yet, one can learn about it. This course offers an opportunity to not only learn about leadership but, more importantly, to explore it first-hand. To this end, the course leverages heavily on the students' own experience through in-class exercises, discussions, dynamics, and the contribution from selected key-note speakers. Furthermore, we will utilize major works from contemporary theater and fiction literature to help us dig deep into the concept of leadership and its implications in our professional life and career.

The prototypical depiction of a leader is that of an individual at the top of an organization's hierarchy commanding and controlling his/her subordinates. This course challenges such stereotypes and presents leadership as a concept and practice that applies to all of us. Leadership does not depend on one's position in the organizational hierarchy, but on one's disposition as an individual. Leadership, as we will see, emerges from the inside out. It requires a high degree of self-awareness.

Against this backdrop, universities have traditionally served two key dimensions of leadership well: knowing (theories, models, frameworks) and doing (skills, competencies, and techniques). Yet, leadership cannot be exclusively understood based on these two components. Leadership also contains an indispensable third dimension: being (values, beliefs, and self-awareness).

We will touch lightly on the "knowing" and "doing" components. Instead, most of the focus will be placed on addressing the often neglected third dimension of leadership: the "being" component. As such, we will reflect critically, e.g., on personal core values and how to live and act on them, on how to pursue purpose in our professions and beyond, on role models and what to learn



from them, and on how to incorporate all these different elements into the pursuit of our careers after our studies at the HSG.

### Course structure and indications of the learning and teaching design

This course is eminently practical. The discussion of leadership scholarly theory plays a secondary role. Instead, the course leverages heavily on students' participation and experience and aims at providing students with time and tools to enhance their self-awareness and work on their "being" component of leadership.

In pre-defined teams, students will be assigned a classic contemporary theater play:

Students will be asked to (1) play a short excerpt of the play they think best illustrates the concept of leadership and (2) discuss/analyze with the class its different components leveraging on the readings/materials covered in class.

In their presentations, students will be encouraged to engage with the audience through creative and effective means, so the dynamic allows for a deeper understanding of the play and its leadership component.

- 1. Leadership as an iceberg, what stays afloat. Managing vs. leading.
- 2. The depth of the iceberg: purpose and values
- 3. Re-emerging to the surface. Leadership: From values to action
- 4. Conclusion

Written work must be written without outside help according to the known citation standards, and a declaration of authorship must be attached, which is available as a template on the StudentWeb.

Documentation (quotations, bibliography, etc.) must be carried out universally and consistently according to the requirements of the chosen/specified citation standard such as e.g. APA or MLA.

The legal standard is recommended for legal work (cf. by way of example: FORSTMOSER, P., OGOREK R., SCHINDLER B., Juristisches Arbeiten: Eine Anleitung für Studierende (the latest edition in each case), or according to the recommendations of the Law School).

The reference sources of information (paraphrases, quotations, etc.) that has been taken over literally or in the sense of the original text must be integrated into the text in accordance with the requirements of the citation standard used. Informative and



bibliographical notes must be included as footnotes (recommendations and standards e.g. in METZGER, C., Lern- und Arbeitsstrategien (latest edition)).

For all written work at the University of St.Gallen, the indication of page numbers is mandatory, regardless of the standard chosen. Where page numbers are missing in sources, the precise designation must be made differently: chapter or section title, section number, article, etc.
