# Learning objectives

The learning objectives of this course aim to help participants live the University of St.Gallen's motto "From Insight to Impact". In this course, participants can expect to:

- Gain an understanding of the most critical and important ethical, responsibility, and sustainability (ERS) challenges facing our world today, including but not limited to human rights, diversity and inclusion, social responsibility, environmental sustainability, and planetary boundaries, and or similar.
- Establish the relevance of ERS challenges to business.
- Become aware of how to embed positive ERS practices into their own research practices, including but not limited to designing research, choice, and application of methods, and selecting research collaborations, author rights, plagiarism, transparency, privacy, data collection, and so on.
- Develop their own ERS agenda how to enact ERS into their own lives, the research community, and practice.
- Learn about key theories and topics of ERS in business scholarship and reflect on how best to embed these into participants' own research agendas.

During this course, you will become familiar with the notions of ERS and be able to apply them to each stage of your own PhD journey-and throughout your academic career-in order to produce valuable, rigorous and high-quality research.

# Course content

This course will cover ERS topics that are relevant in the real-world and explore how these are connected to both business practices and academic scholarship. As such, the course will contain three types of content:



Overview and deep dive of ERS frameworks (e.g., grand challenges, sustainable development goals, diversity and inclusion, social issues like poverty, hunger, education, environmental sustainability topics like planetary boundaries, circular economy, and so on) and application to your PhD content whatever your field.

- 1. Discussions on best practices on ethics and responsibility in research and on the question how we as researchers or future managers want to show up in the world (deliberation on moral issues within and along the PhD process, challenges for future scholars, the community of researchers and more broadly our contribution to a good workplace embedded in the ERS paradigm) and application to your PhD journey whatever your field.
- 1. Exploration of ERS theories and topics in the scholarly literature.

## DAY 2

- Choice of Research Design and Cooperation in Research Team
- Focus on content types A & B

## DAY 3

- Me, the Community and Society Communication

# Course structure and indications of the learning and teaching design

This course is a workshop and will be taught in 3 full-day sessions. It is necessary that all students are expected to be thoroughly prepared for each session. Reading, taking extensive notes and analyzing each reading assignment carefully prior to the meetings is included in an appropriate preparation for the sessions. You are expected to bring your notes to the session.

Grades will consist of three components which will be weighted as follows: 60% Ethics, Responsibility and Sustainability Manifesto (individual assignment), 30% written reflection paper (individual assignment) and 10% active participation including extensive note taking during your readings (individual assignment).

The class is expected to function as an expert team on the respective topic of the full-day sessions.

### **Research Paper**

You are required to submit an individual, manifesto addressing the question '*What does ERS mean to me and to my own research?*'.Thereby, you get the opportunity to incorporate the discussed ERS principles into your own research process. The purpose of this paper is to encourage critical reflection on your respective fields' research as well as develop your ability to relate your dissertation topic to real-world grand challenges.

### Written Reflection Paper

You are expected to discuss the ERS principles with your PhD supervisor and write a reflection paper concerning your insights and takeaways on it. Your paper should be 2 pages and cover the most important insights/ challenges you currently face when incorporating ERS into your research.

Active classroom participation
