# Course prerequisites

Students should be familiar with:

- The economic fundamentals of international trade theory.
- Key aspects of international trade law.

# Learning objectives

Building on a solid understanding of international trade theory (economics) and international trade law, the participants of the course acquire knowledge on the WTO's handling of trade disputes.

This seminar has been successful if students subsequently can analyze current trade disputes from multiple angles - integrating economic, legal, and political considerations.

#### Course content

The World Trade Organization (WTO), founded in 1995, is an intergovernmental organization that regulates and facilitates international trade. Its Appellate Body is a standing body of seven persons that hears appeals from reports issued by panels in disputes brought on by WTO members.

Jim Bacchus was a founding member and twice chairman of this Appellate Body of the WTO in Geneva, Switzerland from 1995 to 2003.

In this seminar, we analyze previous as well as current trade disputes with a particular focus on the WTO. Students will benefit in this three-day seminar from two perspectives: insights from Jim Bacchus' rich expertise and the academic view on international trade.

In groups, students will analyze current as well as recent international trade disputes.

# Course structure and indications of the learning and teaching design

This course takes place as a three-day in-person seminar. There will be an online kick-off session at the beginning of the semester to introduce the course and the cases. Subsequently, students work in groups and prepare a presentation for the block seminar.



#### Course literature

All relevant literature will be provided before the seminar to allow students to prepare.

For the economics of international trade, the book "International Economics" by Krugman, Melitz, and Obstfeld provides an excellent overview. Additional literature is introduced during the kick-off event.

Jim Bacchus has published two books - The Willing World as well as Trade Links - which students may want to study as optional readings.
