Course content

«This is no time for uncertainty: our Union needs a Strategy. We need a shared vision, and common action." The statement by Federica Mogherini, then High Representative of the Union for Foreign Affairs and Security Policy, in the preface to the European Union's foreign policy guideline "Global Strategy" of 2016 has not lost its validity in 2023. However, the appearance of the European Union foreign policy is quite contradictory. On the one hand, the EU seems to have progressed on both common action and strategy with its by now eleventh package of sanctions in reaction to the Russia's invasion of Ukraine and its new "de-risking" approach towards China. On the other hand, the EU faces numerous challenges. These include, for example, the question of coherence between the policies of the member states and European foreign policy or the so far unfulfilled ambition to strategic autonomy. While the EU is perceived as a strong trade power and claims an international leadership role, especially in climate policy, both the EU's actions and its perception in international security policy are significantly weaker.

In this course, we will address the nature and contents of European foreign policy. This implies an engagement with main analytical approach, a discussion of a selected fields of external action of the European Union and an overview of current developments in EU foreign policy. The final decision on the fields we engage with will jointly be made according to the interests of the participants in the first session.
