Course information

Course prerequisites

Students should have successfully completed the MBF courses on Financial Institutions and Financial Markets prior to taking this course. However, there is no expectation that students will have prior professional or academic knowledge in financial regulation.

Learning objectives

The main goal of this course is to cover current topics on the goals, design, implementation, and impact of financial regulation on the capital markets and the financial system. It will discuss the financial regulation frameworks that have evolved after the Global Financial Crisis as well as contemporary emerging topics on regulation of fintech and climate risks. It will also discuss the causes and regulatory responses to the evolving banking crises in 2023.

Course content

The course will cover the following topics. (Note: The list is subject to change.)

- 1. Why regulate? Goals and types of regulation
- 2. Capital and liquidity regulation
- 3. Shadow banking
- 4. OTC derivatives and market infrastructures
- 5. SIFIs and TBTF
- 6. FinTech and BigTech
- 7. Regulation of climate risks

By focusing on the big picture, the course explains the core principles of financial rules and institutional structures so that even when the financial system evolves, students' knowledge will not be out of date.

Course structure and indications of the learning and teaching design

The course will be a mix of lectures, in-class discussions, cases and guest lectures. There will be five cases. Students will work in groups to prepare the cases and will need to submit their written responses before the class. The written assignment and class participation during the case discussions and in-class discussions will be the basis of the final grade. All students working on the case in the same group will receive the same grade. Class participation will receive an individual grade.

The extended course structure with readings and videos for each topic will be available on the course website in digital format. It will be no hard copy handouts. Some cases are obtained through HBS Publishing, and will need to be accesses through HBS Publishing website.
